8 *Whereas* Article 3 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
9 “Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person.”, and

10
11 *Whereas* Article 21, section 2 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
12 states, “Everyone has the right of equal access to public service in his country.”, and

13
14 *Whereas* Article 25, section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
15 states, “Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-
16 being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing, and medical care, and
17 necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment,
18 sickness, disability, widowhood, old age, or other lack of livelihood in circumstances
19 beyond his control.”, and

20
21 *Appalled* Water-related diseases are one of the leading causes of disease and death in the world.
22 At any given time, half of the world's hospital beds are occupied by patients suffering
23 from a water- related disease. Every 15 seconds, a child dies from a water-related
24 disease.1 1.8 million children die each year from diarrhea- 4,900 deaths each day, and
25

26 *Dismayed* 2.6 billion people in the world lack access to proper sanitation resources, and

27
28 *Realizing* that the interventions with the greatest impact on national development and public
29 health are the provision of safe drinking water and the proper disposal of human waste
30 gives us hope for the future,
31

32 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**

- 33
34 1. We plan to build one well in the six poorest cities of the following; Haiti, Kuwait, and the
35 tribal areas in Africa.
36
37 2. If water related diseases decrease by 10% we will expand wells to all over the country
38 and to the other three countries previously stated.
39
40 3. We reach out to Camelbak and Britta to develop a filtered water bottle. When you buy a
41 bottle another one is sent to the countries we are reaching out to. The water bottle will
42 take 8.75 dollars to make and it retail price will be 13.00 dollars plus tax.
43

- 1 4. All water bottles will be sold in all retail stores, they are already sold at internationally.
- 2
- 3 5. Our budget is 26.3 million dollars.
- 4
- 5 6. We plan to tax luxury travel such as cruises and international flight as well as luxury
- 6 imports by 4% to the the top four countries most bountiful in fresh drinking water: United
- 7 States of America, Canada, Russia, and Brazil.
- 8
- 9 7. We plan on asking many nonprofit organizations for whole donations such as, Charity:
- 10 Water, WaterIslife, The Water Project, Pure Water Access Project, Water for the Ages,
- 11 Ecospeakers and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. We will be asking them for
- 12 25,000 per organization.
- 13
- 14 8. From the water bottles we will receive 3 percent of all proceeds for building wells and
- 15 sending doctors.
- 16
- 17 9. For building the wells we plan to mainly recruit volunteers; however, if enough
- 18 volunteers cannot be recruited we will send construction workers and pay them \$5.25 per
- 19 hour.
- 20
- 21 10. The water bottles will be manufactured for two years, starting early 2015. They will be
- 22 on the market in mid-year 2017. If water-related diseases go down 20% we will move on
- 23 to the next four poorest countries.

- 25 11. Overall this will be an 8 year project.

9 **Whereas** Article 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “All
10 human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with
11 reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.”,
12 and
13

14 **Whereas** Article 3 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
15 “Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person.”, and
16

17 **Whereas** Article 4 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
18 shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all
19 their forms.”, and
20

21 **Appalled** that 27 million people are held in modern slavery across the world, and
22

23 **Shocked** that of the 600,000-800,000 people trafficked across the international border annually,
24 over 50% are children, and
25

26 **Dismayed** that 161 countries are identified by affected by human trafficking, and
27

28 **Realizing** that some \$32 billion per year profit is made by criminals who exploit trafficked
29 children for sexual exploitation,
30

31 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
32

- 33 1. The United Nations will create a program named Rehab for Trafficking Victims (RTV)
34 which will be based in Uganda and India. This is a rehab program is designed to assist in the
35 healing of the victims of human trafficking.
36
- 37 2. RTV will include physical and psychological therapy, job training, medical care, education,
38 self-defense training, call system, rehab cab and child/family care, and maternity care.
39
- 40 3. RTV will train inspectors, and provide jobs for everyone that come to the center.
41
- 42 4. Funding –We are requesting an increase of 0.008% of U.N. dues (for ALL member nations)
43 and we will be partnering with (UDAY), in India and Action Group for Health Human Rights

1 and HIV/Aids in Uganda. With these partners, who are already working on trafficking we
2 will share facilities, staff, etc.

3
4 5. Our target goal is to reach 250,000 victims in India and 25,000 victims in Uganda in 3 years,
5 when the U.N. checks the progress of our program. If we have reached our target goal, we
6 will expand the program to China, Ghana and Mexico.

7
8 6. We estimate with building time, that we will be able to be on our way to reaching our target
9 goal between 3-5 years. After 3 years, we would like the U.N. to visit our program and
10 evaluate whether or not it is meeting the needs of the area and if it should be continued.

8 *Whereas* Article 3 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
9 “Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person.”, and

10
11 *Whereas* Article 25, section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
12 states, “Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-
13 being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing, and medical care, and
14 necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment,
15 sickness, disability, widowhood, old age, or other lack of livelihood in circumstances
16 beyond his control.”, and

17
18 Shocked that In Madagascar the infant mortality rate is 51%, and

19
20 Amazed that 47% of the mortality rate caused by malnutrition, and

21
22 Deeply concerned that malnutrition has gone up 50% in the past 5 years (38,000 a year-107 a
23 day), and

24
25 Appalled that 40,000+ (number of children who are malnourished), and

26
27 Confident that once you get children past a certain age (5), survival rate increases (64 years on
28 average) and

29
30 Having considered most of healing done in Madagascar is done by a healing man who uses
31 plants, and

32
33 Recognizing the government provides birthing hospitals to all but clinics and most hospitals are
34 private and with 92% of the population is in poverty most can’t afford them,

35
36 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**

- 37
38 1. The UN will start a program called HCA (Health Care Africa).
39
40 2. HCA will take place in Madagascar.
41
42 3. HCA will ask for the help of the APHA (National and Professional Health Organization) to
43 help raise money to build 50 clinics. (\$19 million)

- 1 4. HCA will ask for volunteers for working in the clinics (doctors, nurses, regular people who
2 would like to help, missionaries, NGOs- non-profit organizations)
3
- 4 5. HCA will ask the UN to raise UN dues of the 10 countries who pay the most UN dues
5 (Canada, China, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, South Korea, Spain, UK, USA) by 1.5% to
6 fund the immediate assistance program which will cost \$400,000 a week.
7
- 8 6. The immediate assistance program funded by the UN will provide peanut paste for \$600 for
9 400 children a day for malnutrition (the clinics can and out since most children die from
10 malnutrition) this will be delivered 3 times a week and the other four days of the week clinics
11 will be supplied with protein biscuits from UN\$400 dollars for 400 biscuits four days a week
12 per clinic. (Altogether food will cost 0.4 million a week)
13
- 14 7. If the program is a success in five years (infant mortality rate to go down 5%) then the
15 program will be expanded to the Congo (middle of Africa and over time will expand to other
16 African countries).

8 *Whereas* Article 3 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
9 “Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person.”, and

10
11 *Whereas* Article 5 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
12 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.”,
13 and

14
15 *Whereas* Article 9 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
16 shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention, or exile.”, and

17
18 *Whereas* Article 25, section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
19 states, “Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-
20 being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing, and medical care, and
21 necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment,
22 sickness, disability, widowhood, old age, or other lack of livelihood in circumstances
23 beyond his control.”, and

24
25 *Appalled* that North Korea holds approximately 150,000 to 200,000 people in its detention and
26 concentration camps, and

27
28 *Horrorified* that about 400,000 people have died due to starvation, disease, torture, and execution
29 in those camps, and

30
31 *Frustrated* that the North Korean government claims the detention and concentration camps
32 don’t exist despite satellite photos of them, and

33
34 *Concerned* that families of political prisoners are also arrested, and

35
36 *Aware* that Kim Jong-un and his government held an election on March 9, 2014 in which 100%
37 of the vote went towards Kim Jong-un, the only candidate on the ballot, and

38
39 *Worried* that in March 2011 a joint UN survey estimated that over six million vulnerable persons
40 in North Korea urgently required international food assistance to avoid famine, and
41

1 **Knowing** that provisions sent by the United Nations do not make it to the hungry citizens of
2 North Korea,
3

4 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
5

- 6 1. The United Nations will implement a program called INKS (International North Korean
7 Support).
8
- 9 2. **INKS** will work with China, North Korea's sole ally, to get food provisions to North Korea.
10 INKS will also rely on the cooperation of South Korea to get supplies, by boat via South
11 Korean islands off southwest coast of North Korea, into North Korea.
12
- 13 3. To earn China's cooperation, the UN will wave their dues for the duration of the program
14 and emphasize the positive effect their help will have in the eyes of the rest of the world.
15
- 16 4. Chinese negotiators will be sent to speak with North Korean government officials to hold
17 them accountable for provisions donated, suggesting more intense repercussions in the
18 future if food is not provided to North Korean citizens .
19
- 20 5. International pressure will be put on Kim Jong-un to cooperate with the INKS initiative to
21 get provisions to North Koreans. If necessary, have the United States withdraw troops from
22 South Korea as a compromise, or get U.S. to agree, even temporarily, to refrain from practice
23 military drills in South Korea.
24
- 25 6. U.N. Peace-keeping troops will go into detention and concentration camps via China with
26 their cooperation, and liberate the political prisoners and their families. This will involve a
27 large number of troops and the use of EMP (Electro Magnetic Pulse) devices to remain
28 undetected by the larger North Korean military.
29
- 30 7. The U.N. Peace-keeping troops will get former prisoners safely out of North Korea in
31 Armored Personnel Carriers taken into China.
32
- 33 8. Refugee camps will be set up in China and South Korea for former North Korean prisoners.
34
- 35 9. Once settled, the UN will ask the freed prisoners for detailed, accurate accounts of prison
36 conditions and conditions for North Koreans out of prison, especially related to food
37 availability. Information gained from former prisoners will be used to raise awareness of
38 true North Korean conditions to the world.
39
- 40 10. **INKS** will work with South Korea to monitor the North Korean border, possibly encouraging
41 and aiding North Koreans who want to escape their country.
42

- 1 11. **INKS** will also help South Korea increase their border satellites for cell phones, hopefully
2 improving the accessibility to global information for North Koreans.
3
- 4 12. Cell phone companies throughout the world will be asked to donate cell phones to INKS.
5 They will then be smuggled into North Korea with Internet access through South Korean
6 towers/satellites. INKS will create advertisement campaigns of their program which will
7 encourage cell phone carriers to participate and donate. Cell phone companies will also ask
8 paying customers to donate a \$1 a month for INKS and/or round up their monthly bill to the
9 nearest dollar, which will go towards funding INKS.
10
- 11 13. Part one of INKS, invading the camps and freeing prisoners, will be completed within five
12 years. The cell phone distribution will be ongoing indefinitely. The ultimate goal will be for
13 North Koreans to plan a rebellion, possibly with the UN's help, against Kim Jong-un once a
14 much more widespread awareness of his corrupt leadership is known and understood within
15 North Korea.
16
- 17 14. The upfront costs of INKS will be approximately 5 million dollars. Some of this will come
18 out of general UN funds, but cell phone donations will help, too. A committee will be
19 formed to explore other payment options once the program begins operation.
20
21
