3 **Re.:** Deforestation in Ecuador

8 *Whereas* Article 5 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
9 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.”,
10 and
11

12 *Whereas* Article 10 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
13 “Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and
14 impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal
15 charge against him.”, and
16

17 *Whereas* Article 17, section 2 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
18 states, “No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.”, and
19

20 *Appalled* that 66,000 hectares of Ecuador’s forest are destroyed each year, and
21

22 *Shocked* that it is estimated that Ecuador has lost more than 56% of its total forests. With forest
23 originally covering 47.5% of Ecuador, and
24

25 *Dismayed* that Ecuador is the 8th most biodiverse country in the world, and
26

27 *Realizing* that deforestation in Ecuador for the first three months of 2013 was pacing more than
28 300 percent ahead of last year's rate,
29

30 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
31

- 32 1. The United Nations will begin a program call Tree Trunk Trio (TTT) which will focus in
33 Ecuador. However, we will also start this program in Brazil, Indonesia, Mexico, and Sudan
34 after the project has proved successful for two consecutive years.
35
- 36 2. 25% of the remaining forest and it inhabitants are to be put under federal protection before
37 any more deforestation takes place.
38
- 39 3. Ecuador will be limited to only being able to cut down 30,000 hectares of forest every year.
40 And 1/5 of that amount needs to be replanted every year.
41
- 42 4. TTT will train private inspectors to go to Ecuador and make sure that the construction
43 companies are obeying the new rules and they will see if the health of the environment is

1 getting better.

2

3 5. To fund this project, TTT request that the U.N. raise the dues for the top 15 wealthiest
4 countries by 1%.

5

6 6. If the project doesn't start to have effect within the first 10 years the project will be
7 terminated. By effect we mean 25% more of the forests should be there than there would
8 have been before.

9 **Whereas** Article 4 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
10 shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all
11 their forms.”, and
12

13 **Whereas** Article 5 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
14 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.”,
15 and
16

17 **Whereas** Article 24 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
18 “Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working
19 hours and periodic holidays with pay.”, and
20

21 **Realizing that**, according to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, human trafficking is
22 the trade of humans, most commonly for the purpose of sexual slavery, forced labor or
23 commercial sexual exploitation for the trafficker or others. Human trafficking can occur
24 within a country or trans-nationally. Human trafficking is a crime against the person
25 because of the violation of the victims’ rights movement through coercion and because of
26 their commercial exploitation, and
27

28 **Alarmed** by the fact that there are approximately 20 to 30 million slaves in the world, and
29

30 **Recognizing** that, 68.3% of human trafficking victims are female, and 31.8% are male, and
31

32 **Knowing** that 76% of the world's slaves are in ten countries, including India, China, The
33 Democratic Republic of Congo, and Russia, and
34

35 **Fully aware** in 1850 the cost to buy a slave was about **\$40,000** in today's money. Now it only
36 costs **\$90**, and
37

38 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
39

- 40 1. The United Nations will start a program called HTRO (Human Trafficking Resistance
41 Organization).
42

- 1 2. Our program will focus on human trafficking, most specifically in Russia and China.
- 2
- 3 3. We are requesting that the U.N. raise dues on the ten nations that pay the highest amount
- 4 on dues by 0.3%. This will generate an estimated \$5,500,000 U.S. dollars.
- 5
- 6 4. The money will be used for startup funding to make t-shirts in one fair wage factory, with
- 7 adequate working hours and proper safety of workers. It will be located in China, to help
- 8 spread awareness of human trafficking.
- 9
- 10 5. We will also create a website with information about human trafficking and links to
- 11 social networking sites related to our cause and a place to buy the t-shirts.
- 12
- 13 6. The United Nations is responsible for monitoring the success of the program.
- 14
- 15 7. We will evaluate success every 2 years.
- 16
- 17 8. We will measure success of the program by number of t-shirts sold and number page
- 18 views on the website. A second way to measure the program's success is when the
- 19 amount of money made covers the cost of running the factory.
- 20
- 21 9. If successful, the program will expand to Russia and build a second factory.
- 22
- 23 10. The members of HTRO will be responsible for making sure the program is carried out.

3 **Re.:** Women and Children’s Rights in Fiji

8 **Whereas** Article 5 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
9 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.”,
10 and
11

12 **Whereas** Article 23 section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
13 states, “Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and
14 favorable conditions of work and to protection against unemployment.”, and
15

16 **Whereas** Article 26, section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
17 states, “Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the
18 elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory.
19 Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher
20 education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.”, and
21

22 **Outraged** that 80% of women in Fiji have witnessed some form of violence in their home, and
23

24 **Disturbed** that 66% have been physically abused by partners and nearly half repeatedly abused,
25 26% have been beaten while pregnant and 13% have been raped, and
26

27 **Horriified** that 15% of sexual assault and rape victims are under the age of 12, and
28

29 **Infuriated** that every day more than 70 women are knocked unconscious in Fiji as the result of
30 an act of domestic violence, while around 40 women suffer injuries,
31

32 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
33

- 34 1. The United Nations will begin a program called Give Women and Children Rights (GWCR),
35 which will focus on the rural areas of Fiji.
36
- 37 2. GWCR will work to stop cruel acts against women and children in Fiji and will work to
38 make sure women and children in Fiji have equal rights.
39
- 40 3. GWCR will send 20 United Nations Social Workers and Human Rights Workers on one
41 custom V-22 Osprey, used as a mobile support centers, donated to this project from Finland
42 for use in the rural areas to help abused women and children and teach them about their
43 rights.

- 1
- 2 4. When the mobile support center arrives, United Nations social workers and human rights
- 3 workers will inspect random homes and if they find evidence of abuse, they will bring the
- 4 family to the mobile center for safety, questioning, and education of their rights. These visits
- 5 will be random so that the family will not be able to hide any evidence of abuse.
- 6
- 7 5. If it is proven that there is abuse, then the abuser will spend 1 year to life in jail depending on
- 8 the degree of assault. The family will continue education about their rights.
- 9
- 10 6. This project will cost \$13 million dollars so we will raise the dues on the top 10 countries
- 11 with high women and children abuse by 10% which will raise \$13,738,716.00
- 12
- 13 7. The top 10 violating countries are Chad, India, Pakistan, Democratic Republic of Congo,
- 14 Indonesia, Mali, Yemen, Turkey, Afghanistan, and Russia.
- 15
- 16 8. If after 5 years the percent of abuse has decreased by 4% then GWCR will continue the
- 17 program and spread to other countries with high abuse rates like India, Egypt, and
- 18 Afghanistan.

8 **Whereas** Article 2 section 1 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
9 states, “Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration,
10 without any distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political
11 or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.”, and
12

13 **Whereas** Article 18 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
14 “Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience, and religion; this right
15 includes freedom to change his religion of belief, and freedom, either alone or in
16 community with others in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching,
17 practice, worship and observance.”, and
18

19 **Whereas** Article 19 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
20 “Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom
21 to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and
22 ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.”, and
23

24 **Appalled** that from 2008 to 2012 the number of websites blocked has increased from about
25 26,000 to about 40,000, and
26

27 **Shocked** that slander cases have doubled from 5,000 in 2007 to over 10,000 in 2011, and
28

29 **Dismayed** that South Korean internet has gone from 28,000 blocked websites to 40,000 in 3
30 years, and
31

32 **Realizing** that South Korea has the fastest average internet speed in the world,
33

34 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
35

- 36 1. We propose a plan that we will sanction used South Korean products (such as computers, and
37 other electronics) manufactured by the government until they choose to allow free speech.
38
39 2. We will do this until they allow free speech.

4 **Submitted to:** General Assembly
5 **Submitted by:** Libya, Greece, New Zealand, Madagascar
6 **Date:** April 3, 2014
7

8 *Whereas* Article 3 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
9 “Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person.”, and

10
11 *Whereas* Article 28, of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
12 “Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms
13 set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.”, and
14

15 *Affirming that*, according to the FBI, there “is no single, universally accepted, definition of
16 terrorism,” but the U.S. federal code defines it as “ the unlawful use of force and violence
17 against persons or property to intimidate or coerce a government, the civilian population,
18 or any segment thereof, in furtherance of political or social objectives.”, and
19

20 *Alarmed that* the total number of terrorist attacks worldwide so far in 2014 equals 64, and
21

22 *Recognizing that*, according to Dictionary.com, Al-Qaeda began as a radical Sunni Muslim
23 organization dedicated to the elimination of a Western presence in Arab countries,
24 militantly opposed to Western foreign policy, founded by Osama Bin Laden in 1988, and
25

26 *Keeping in mind that* Al-Qaeda is now recognized as a covert network of likeminded groups
27 rather than one single organization, and
28

29 *Noting with deep concern that*, according to CIA Director John O. Brennan, Al-Qaeda is
30 seeking to use Syria as a recruiting ground and a launching pad for bigger attacks outside
31 of Syria, and
32

33 *Taking into consideration that* refugee camps are perfect places for terrorist groups to do
34 recruiting because people are without homes and jobs,
35

36 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
37

- 38 1. The United Nations will begin a program called United Nations Terrorism Prevention
39 Organization (UNTPO).
- 40
41 2. UNTPO will decrease terrorism in select countries, beginning with Syria and expanding
42 to Libya.
43

- 1 3. UNTPO will recruit and train Syrians to act as an information gathering force to help
2 identify terrorist activity and recruitment efforts in refugee camps.
3
- 4 4. This information-gathering force will report their findings to the UNTPO.
5
- 6 5. UNTPO will share this information with the Syrian government as well as neighboring
7 governments and the United Nations.
8
- 9 6. UN Peacekeepers will be hired to keep identified Al-Qaeda recruiters out of refugee
10 camps.
11
- 12 7. Job training facilities will be set up within the refugee camps to persuade refugees to
13 separate themselves from Al-Qaeda.
14
- 15 8. Success will be measured by determining if there is a decrease in terrorist attacks within
16 the program's first two years.
17
- 18 9. If this program is successful it will be expanded to Libya.
19
- 20 10. To fund UNTPO, we request that the UN raise dues on the 10 nations that pay the highest
21 amount of dues wealthiest nations by 0.5%.
22
- 23 11. The funds generated, \$9,548,909, will be used to train and pay the Syrian information-
24 gathering forces, pay the UN Peacekeepers, share information, and set up/operate job
25 training in the refugee camps.

6 **Date:** April 3, 2014
7

8 **Whereas** Article 5 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
9 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.”,
10 and
11

12 **Whereas** Article 9 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states, “No one
13 shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention, or exile.”, and
14

15 **Whereas** Article 19 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS states,
16 “Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom
17 to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and
18 ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.”, and
19

20 **Whereas** Article 25, section 2 of the UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS
21 states, “Motherhood and childhood are entitled to special care and assistance. All
22 children, whether born or in out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.”, and
23

24 **Shocked** that over 200,000 people have been imprisoned in these prison camps in North Korea,
25 and
26

27 **Appalled** that pregnant women have been forced to carry heavy loads until the point that they
28 miscarry, and
29

30 **Horried** that prisoners are so underfed that they have been caught eating snakes, rats, dogs, and
31 cattle feed, and
32

33 **Realizing** that entire families have been put in jail for the actions of one person, and
34

35 **Dismayed** that survivors have reported seeing children fighting for a corn cob covered in cow
36 dung because they were so hungry,
37

38 **Be It Hereby Resolved That The General Assembly:**
39

- 40 1. Create a program called, **Stop Prison Camps in North Korea (SPCNK)** which will impose
41 sanctions on North Korea until UN inspectors are allowed to look at the prison camps. These
42 sanctions will include a ban on exports of minerals, metals, and semi-precious metals, textile

- 1 exports, and banning trade with their main trade partner, China, to which North Korea sells
2 42% of their exports and from which North Korea receives 57% of its imports.
3
- 4 2. If UN inspectors are allowed in North Korea then the new sanctions will be revised.
5
 - 6 3. We will partner with the **HRNK (Human Rights in North Korea)** for funding and for
7 information.
8
 - 9 4. If the UN inspectors are allowed to enter and inspect North Korea's prison camps, which no
10 one has ever been allowed to do before, within 3 years then the project will be considered a
11 success.
12
 - 13 5. We will hire 200 people to form a team of inspectors. The 5 countries with the highest
14 population which are China, India, Unites States, Indonesia and Brazil will provide 40 people
15 each to determine the level of the human rights violations and to improve existing conditions.
16
 - 17 6. In order to raise funds to hire inspectors we will raise dues on the 3 countries that profit most
18 from petroleum sales, which are Qatar, Bahrain, and Kuwait by \$700,000 dollars each in
19 order to raise 2.1 million dollars.
20
 - 21 7. If the project is a success then this plan will be implemented in other countries with prison
22 camps such as Venezuela, Russia, Syria, and Brazil.
23
