sanctions will include a ban on exports of minerals, metals, and semi-precious metals, textile

exports, and banning trade with their main trade partner, China, to which North Korea sells 42% of their exports and from which North Korea receives 57% of its imports.

2. If UN inspectors are allowed in North Korea then the new sanctions will be revised.

3. We will partner with the **HRNK** (**Human Rights in North Korea**) for funding and for information.

4. If the UN inspectors are allowed to enter and inspect North Korea's prison camps, which no one has ever been allowed to do before, within 3 years then the project will be considered a success.

5. We will hire 200 people to form a team of inspectors. The 5 countries with the highest population which are China, India, Unites States, Indonesia and Brazil will provide 40 people each to determine the level of the human rights violations and to improve existing conditions.

6. In order to raise funds to hire inspectors we will raise dues on the 3 countries that profit most from petroleum sales, which are Qatar, Bahrain, and Kuwait by \$700,000 dollars each in order to raise 2.1 million dollars.

7. If the project is a success then this plan will be implemented in other countries with prison camps such as Venezuela, Russia, Syria, and Brazil.
