




DEMOGRAPHICS OF SAMPLE

















5. How would you change the way candidates run campaigns and how media covers them?





Some quick observations and questions

- 1. Students did a very comprehensive job of getting responders to answer as many questions as possible. That is not an easy task.
- 2. Regarding demographics:
 - a. Not a bad split on males (44%) and females (56%).
 - b. Pretty good distribution of age groups. It's a little low on the 51+ crowd, but often times the older people are the less likely they are to be comfortable responding to "intercept polling."
 - c. Out of 54 respondents who provided their zip code, 34 zip codes are represented. The highest number was from Clayton (63105). It might be interesting to create a "heat map" reflecting from zip codes in the St. Louis metropolitan area the respondents live in [the color of the map of the zip codes is more intense depending on the number of respondents from that zip code.]

3. Actual responses:

- a. There are lots of ways to look at this, but one question is this:
 - i. While Hillary Clinton was favored by a majority of respondents (53%), the responses to question 4 indicated that twice as many people think that the country is moving too far in a liberal direction than conservative direction. Why is this so?
- b. We can do a lot more in analyzing answers by gender, age group or zip code. We could also look at questions like "Of those people favoring Donald Trump, how many think that the country is "moving in the right direction?"
